Cameo: Andy Redman gave a very entertaining presentation on his skydiving experience on Cana-



da Day in 2008 when he was 71. He was inspired by George Bush Sr. who did the same at age 80. Andy's group boarded the plane at Skydive Burnaby in Wainfleet, flew to 14,000 feet and Andy jumped from the plane with an instructor harnessed to his back. The first minute was freefall with four-to-five minutes under parachute when Andy had the controls ending in a perfect gentle landing. Andy showed a video that another "diver" took from when he boarded the plane to his landing. Some interesting facial expressions as Andy left the plane and descended helped capture the excitement and thrill of the skydive. Andy emphasized that "age is no barrier" and said "don't be afraid your life will end, be afraid it will never begin!" He also mentioned the Chicago woman, Dorothy Hoffner, who set a world record recently with a skydive at the age of 104.

Speaker warns of scams, threats directed at seniors

Duncan McLaren introduced speaker Ernie Sibbett, chair of the board of Crimestoppers Niagara, who was accompanied by Dorothy Nugent and Carolyn Robinson from Crimestoppers.

Ernie talked about the Niagara Elder Abuse Prevention Network and its safety guide called "*Be Aware...Take Care.*" Ernie said that Crime Stoppers, which receives a yearly grant of \$50,000

from Niagara Region, fields 60 to 70 calls per day related to elder abuse.

The program's aim is to provide information on fraud, scams, and threats to elders and to assist them if they are victims. He reviewed some of the scams directed at seniors such as telemarketing, mail or newspaper marketing, cyber scams, thefts by

deception or distraction, bank related scams and identity theft.

Ernie offered examples of scams such as someone calling claiming to be from your bank or from the CRA demanding immediate payment; someone calling to warn that your computer has been infected with a virus but they can fix it if you give them access to your computer. A common one is someone calling pretending to be a friend or relative in an emergency and in need of money.

He warned of two red flags related to such calls: an immediate request for money or a request for personal information. He advised that in such cases, you should hang up immediately. He noted that many people fail to do so but recommended that if potential victims have concerns, they should notify the police.

Ernie also warned about door-to-door sales. Provincial laws ban door-to-door sales for certain household appliances, but he said you shouldn't feel pressured and should never allow strangers into your home. As a rule, don't enter into any contract with someone that you didn't initiate contact with. Ernie recommended signing up with the National Do Not Call List. Although this won't eliminate all unsolicited calls, it can reduce the number and type of calls you receive.

Ernie also spoke about the Niagara Community Information Database which can be reached by calling 211 to receive information about a wide variety of government and other service providers. Ernie mentioned the importance of having a legal Power of Attorney for both personal care and for property to designate someone to make important decisions if you become incapable.

Duncan thanked Ernie for his important and informative presentation and presented him with a gift certificate.



Introduction to Bob Latham

(Bob Latham, who joined the PROBUS Club in October, submitted the following summary of his very active life.)

I grew up in Beamsville, Ontario where my dad was the local doctor for some 30+ years.

I graduated from Queen's University with an MA in Geography; had the privilege of playing Gael's football for five years (2time MVP, Captain, and Hall of Fame). Challenge: what else can a geography grad do other than teach?? Went to work for Bell Canada in 1967; had the privilege to have five very separate



careers: (Forecasting, Regulatory, Operations (Eastern and Northern Ontario, and Saudi Arabia), Bell Cellular for five years (first president) grew from 100 to 1,000 employees; resource person for the Canadian Armed Forces National Defense College (travelled and studied around the world for a year), National Account Sales; retired after 28 years in December 1995.

Started work in a telecom company in London, England in February 1996 and then a satellite company in Reston, Virginia followed by a return to a startup telecom company in Toronto ... Unfortunately, it fell to its demise as did many other

companies when the "dot com" bubble imploded.

In 2006, after looking around the world, Nicaragua found me; bought a property and over the next 10 years built and operated a boutique hotel on the Pacific Coast with my partner Joanne <u>https://www.youtube.com/embed/r3tixvEIXUM</u>. I had to leave because of health issues (a rare heart decease). Fortunately, in March 2018, we completed the sale three weeks before the country broke down in civil unrest.

I currently live in St. Catharines. I have two wonderful boys I am very proud of, who live in Oakville; four grandchildren who are at or recently completed university; a wonderful experience has been getting to participate in the growth of a "granddaughter" who was born in Nicaragua to my partner Joanne's daughter. (Girls grow up different than boys).

Much of my career I have tried to make a difference in the lives of others; as such, I have been very involved in a number of charitable organizations; YMCA, Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario (CHEO), Oakville Community Foundation (coach and judge for Tech Under-20 program), Junior Achievement (Chair, Halton-Niagara). In Nicaragua we were able to fix up schools and medical stations, organize back packs, shoes and food drives while assisting craftspeople in building their businesses.

In the last few years, I have organized a 60th reunion of Beamsville High School Grads (through the COVID challenges) and the 60th reunion of the early sixties (1960-64) Golden Gaels football teams as well as initiating and successfully driving a \$125K athletic scholarship fund.

The PROBUS Club of St. Catharines, now celebrating 35 years, is one of the oldest in Canada



and was sponsored by the Rotary Club of St. Catharines South. The first organizational meetings were held in the former Domenic's Yorkshire House on

Academy Street.

One of the founding members, Stuart Glass, who went on to become president and later, a life member, compiled a detailed history of the early years of the club listing the names of members, officers and even speakers during those first years.

The club operated in the first year with the financial backing of the Rotary Club but became self-supporting in May of 1989 and elected its first management committee with Ross Lawless becoming the first president.

As the club grew, its meeting site moved to the Royal Canadian Legion, then to Club Roma and later to Black Sea Hall and finally to the Grantham Lions Hall. This club has also sponsored three other active PROBUS Clubs in Niagara.

Membership numbers have varied over the years and after a slump influenced by COVID, hopes are high that we are in the early stages of a resurgence.

How Britain came to honour the Unknown Warrior

On November 7th, 1920, in strictest secrecy, four unidentified British bodies were exhumed from temporary battlefield cemeteries at Ypres, Arras, the Asine and the Somme.

None of the soldiers who did the digging were told why.

The bodies were taken by field ambulance to GHQ at St-Pol-Sur-Ter Noise. Once there, the bodies were draped with the union flag.

Sentries were posted and Brigadier-General Wyatt and a Colonel Gell selected one body at random. The other three were reburied.

A French Honour Guard was selected and stood by the coffin overnight of the chosen soldier.

On the morning of the 8th Novem-

ber, a specially designed coffin made of oak from the grounds of Hampton Court arrived and the Unknown Warrior was placed inside.

On top was placed a crusaders sword and a shield on which was inscribed:

"A British Warrior who fell in the GREAT WAR 1914-1918 for King and Country".

On the 9th of November, the Unknown Warrior was taken by horse-drawn carriage through Guards of Honour and the sound of tolling bells and bugle calls to the guayside.

There, he was saluted by Marshall Ferdinand Foch and loaded onto HMS Vernon bound for Dover. The coffin stood on the deck covered in

Upon arrival at Dover, the Unknown Warrior was met with a nineteen-gun salute — something that was normally only reserved for Field Marshals.

A special train had been arranged and he was then conveyed to Victoria Station, London.

He remained there overnight, and, on the morning of the 11th of November, he was finally taken to Westminster Abbey.

The idea of the unknown warrior was thought of by a Padre called David Railton who had served on the front line during the Great War. The Union flag he had used as an altar cloth whilst at the front, was the one that had been draped over the coffin.

It was his intention that all of the relatives of the 517,773 combatants whose bodies had not been identified could believe that the Unknown Warrior could very well be their lost husband, father, brother or son...

THIS is the reason we wear poppies.

We do not glorify war.

We remember — with humility — the great and the ultimate sacrifices that were made, not just in this war, but in every war and conflict where our service personnel have fought - to ensure the liberty and freedoms that we now take for granted.

Every year, on the 11th of November, we remember the Unknown Warrior.
